He's an angel in the day, he's a devil late at night.

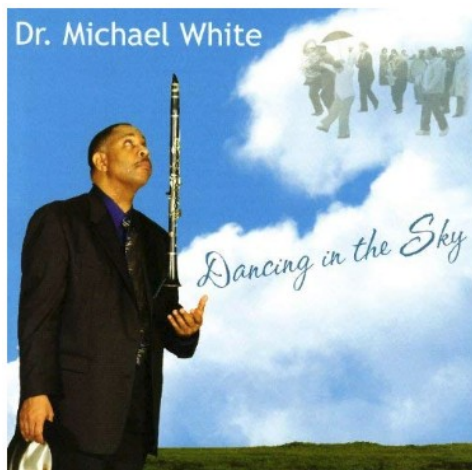
He's an angel in the day, Lord - he's a devil late at night.

**beau** Synonym for "boyfriend". Origin: French.

**to creep** To walk quietly, to avoid detection.

**wench** Informal word for "woman". Not in common use today.

**heffer** Informal word for "a conceited woman" or "a woman with a bad attitude".

**doggone** Informal American English (adjective/adverb) used to express feelings of annoyance, anger, surprise, or pleasure. Examples:

- He's doggone cheating on me!
- Doggone it! I've lost my keys again!
- It's doggone good to be home.
